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CGA Lifetime Achievement Recipient

The CGA is proud to announce that Dr. Dennis Ahnen will be receiving the 2018 Lifetime Achievement award for his contributions to the understanding and treatment of hereditary gastrointestinal cancer syndromes. Dr. Ahnen has conducted pivotal work in the biochemical mechanisms of the chemopreventive effects of NSAIDs in colorectal cancer and contributed substantially to landmark clinical trials in chemoprevention, colorectal cancer screening and behavioral interventions to promote screening in high-risk families. He is a leader in national efforts to promote screening through the National Colorectal Cancer Round Table and co-chairs the Family History Task Force. Not only has he had a substantial influence in our field, he has touched countless lives in his clinical care, research collaborations, professional society roles and mentorship of innumerable trainees.

He will be honored with a reception with appetizers and drinks following the meeting sessions on Monday, October 15. This event is included in the meeting registration fee and we hope to see everyone there.
