• The Education Committee is excited to introduce three new members:

Pooja Dharwadkar, MD is a gastroenterologist and Clinical Assistant Professor in the Division of Gastroenterology at the University of California San Francisco - Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital. She completed her undergraduate and medical school training at the University of Miami (FL) followed by residency and fellowship in Gastroenterology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas. She has published on racial and ethnic disparities in germline genetic testing of patients with young-onset colorectal cancer as well as in better describing the phenotype of young-onset colorectal cancer. Her interests include hereditary GI cancer syndromes and young-onset colon cancer.

Jessica Long, MS, CGC is a Licensed, Certified Genetic Counselor specializing in Cancer Genetics. After completing her Master's Degree in Human Genetics/Genetic Counseling at the University of Michigan, Jessica spent several years as a genetic counselor in the University of Michigan Cancer Genetics Clinic before joining the University of Pennsylvania's Cancer Risk Evaluation Program, Gastrointestinal Cancer Genetics Program and Basser Center for BRCA in 2012. Her expertise encompasses a variety of hereditary cancer conditions, including Hereditary Breast and Ovarian Cancer syndrome and hereditary gastrointestinal syndromes such as Lynch syndrome and familial polyposis, and she has contributed to a number of peer-reviewed articles and reviews on these topics. Jessica also actively contributes to the University of Pennsylvania Master's Program in Genetic Counseling.

Joshua Sommovilla, MD is a colorectal surgeon and new member of CGAs education committee. Prior to joining the colorectal surgery staff at the Cleveland Clinic, Josh completed a subspecialty fellowship at the Sanford R Weiss Center for Hereditary Colorectal Neoplasia Syndromes, and he has particular interests in polyposis syndromes and desmoid disease. In addition to his background as a colorectal surgeon, Josh is board-certified in palliative medicine and is passionate about high-stakes decision-making in the setting of serious illness.
